From the President

The AGM is now not far away and it is time to have a think about who you would like to see leading the club for the next 12 months. We do regularly need a "change of blood" to re-focus and refine our aims to keep the club active and vibrant. We have around 60 members, surely there are a few out there that can spare a couple of hours a month to give something back for what you've got out of it. As to the AGM, I had a discussion with most of the committee members this week and decided to move it back one month until immediately after the November General meeting, for several reasons. Before the General meeting on the 1st October, a Sausage Sizzle will be held from around 11:30 am.

Remember, the AGM will be held on Saturday 5th November, following the General meeting at the Clubrooms. A 1 00pm start as usual.


A little bit of self-promotion.

I know many of you use Ham Radio Deluxe as you computer logging software. I thought the following story from the ARRL Website may be of interest.


Simon Brown, HB9DRV, has sold the rights to his popular <u>Ham Radio Deluxe</u> software package to a group consisting of Mike Carper, WA9PIE, Randy Gawtry, K0CBH and Rick Ruhl, W4PC. All three principals have more than 25 years of experience with radio data communications. Rick Ruhl is the president of <u>W4PC</u> <u>Software, Inc</u> whose products include the *PakRatt*, *PKTerm* and *Radio Operations Center* software suites. Randy Gawtry is the president of <u>Timewave Technology Inc</u> whose products include the PK and DSP families of data controllers and other commercial data products. Mike Carper is an experienced Fortune 500 technology executive, educator and featured speaker in the areas of wireless technologies and IT Service Management.

"Simon has done a fantastic job with this software," Carper said. "His vision for integrating rig control, rotor control, logging, digital modes, and satellite operations into a single integrated feature-rich software suite has captivated the ham radio community. We'd like to see this product continue in a way that respects the hard work put into this package by Simon and others, maintaining that vision, while delivering timely fixes and feature enhancements in the future, will be the number one priority."

"After many years writing the *Ham Radio Deluxe* software it's necessary to take a break and hand the whole project over to another team," said Simon Brown, HB9DRV. "The support effort required has become more than I can realistically manage, with many thousands of users, new radios and other hardware appearing all the time and unexpected changes to the infrastructure used by *Ham Radio Deluxe* such as QRZ.com, I no longer have any time at all for other projects. As some of you will know, I have formed a company called <u>SDR-</u>

RADIO.com GmbH and I am now working in the Software Defined Radio arena with RFspace. This is the technology of the future; a future I want a part of. In 2012 I plan to return to England and get back on the air, something I haven't done much during the last 25 years."

The new owners are in the process of building a development environment for *Ham Radio Deluxe* and they plan to begin by addressing some of the bugs in the existing "To Do List" for an upcoming version 5.1 release. The 5.1 release will be made available at no charge to registered users when completed.

100-year-old Aussie Ham Can Still Read The News

A bunch of Amateur Radio operators in Sydney Australia gathered on Fathers Day 2011, to honour Pierce Healy, who had celebrated his 100th birthday just a few days before.

Pierce Healy is still known by his amateur radio call sign, VK2APQ, although he no longer has his two-way radios to play with. He was a very active Amateur Radio operator for more than 30 years, and used to write a column called Amateur Notes in Radio and Hobbies magazine, which later grew into Electronics Australia magazine.

The radio hams gathered at the premises of ARNSW in Dural, New South Wales, where licensed amateur radio operators still broadcast a weekly news bulletin to other ham radio enthusiasts across the state and beyond. The transmissions go out on multiple transmitters, which cover a range of shortwave, VHF and UHF frequencies, and are sent both morning and evening on Sundays.

Pierce VK2APQ used to compile the news broadcasts when he was younger and would read them over the air as well. But today, the task is shared by a team of licensed radio hams who collect and write the news about ham radio operators and their activities both in Australia and around the world. Most New South Wales radio clubs send notes about their activities to the ARNSW news team by e-mail or fax, and it is compiled and edited before being read over their airways on Sundays. And when the broadcast is over, the announcer and engineer take callbacks directly over the air from their listeners -- who report their name and location, and rate the quality of the radio signal they heard. This is all noted and recorded in the radio station log book.

Pierce VK2APQ is still able to get around by using his walker, and went 'on the air' again during the Fathers Day Sunday broadcast to read one of the news items, from the St George Amateur Radio Club, a group he helped to start.

After the broadcast, Pierce Healy, who was accompanied by his daughter, walked across to the club shed where a barbecue lunch was being grilled for the hungry hams. Pierce cut a birthday cake and managed to blow out the candles with one puff. He was presented with a certificate from the ARNSW club to honour his centenary. And he was given a special radio call sign and license issued by the ACMA, the Australian government authority in charge of radio licensing.

Pierce's new license is valid for one month, and did not have the usual "VK" prefix which is used to identify Australian radio operators. It was just "100 Pierce".

The ARNSW (Amateur Radio New South Wales) club, used to be the NSW Division of the WIA (Wireless Institute of Australia). The WIA was the first society of Amateur Radio Operators in the world. It was formed before the ARRL in the United States and the RSGB in the United Kingdom.
